<b>1648 BREWERY</b> East Hoathly, East Sussex	<b>Pure Gold (5.0% ABV)</b> A fairly new beer from this brewery; it is a strong, gold coloured hoppy ale.		
	<b>Signature (4.4% ABV)</b> An award winning light-coloured beer; this best bitter with distinctive hop notes was launched at this beer festival in 2004.		
	<b>Saint George (4.5% ABV)</b> Brewed with Sussex Hops, Malted barley and South Downs water. A real English beer for Saint George - a Patron Saint is there all year round.		
	<b>Winter Warrant (4.8% ABV)</b> Very dark in colour with a smooth roasted flavour.		
<b>ARUNDEL</b> Ford, West Sussex	<b>ASB (4.5% ABV)</b> A special bitter with a complex roast malt flavour leading to a fruity, hoppy, bitter-sweet finish.		
	<b>Castle (3.8% ABV)</b> A pale tawny beer with fruit and malt noticeable in the aroma. The flavour has a good balance of malt, fruit and hops, with a dry, hoppy finish.		
	<b>Old Knucker (5.5% ABV)</b> Dark old ale with a malt and fruit aroma. Malt dominates the taste with bittersweet coffee finish.		
	<b>Stronghold (4.7% ABV)</b> A smooth, full-flavoured premium bitter. A good balance of malt and hops comes through in this rich, chestnut-coloured beer.		
	<b>Sussex Gold (4.2% ABV)</b> A golden-coloured best bitter with a strong floral hop aroma. The ale is clean tasting and surprisingly bitter with a tangy citrus flavour and long, dry finish.		

	<p><b>Sussex Mild (3.7% ABV)</b> A dark mild with strong chocolate and roast aromas, which lead to a bitter taste. Slight aftertaste where the initial flavours remain in the dry clean finish.</p>		
<p><b>BALLARDS</b> Nyewood, West Sussex</p>	<p><b>Darkly Veiled (9.7% ABV)</b> Ballard's strong ale for winter 06-07; heaped with malt and fruity flavours. Treat with respect.</p>		
	<p><b>Golden Bine (3.8% ABV)</b> Amber, clean tasting bitter. A roast malt aroma leads to a fruity, slightly sweet taste and dry finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Midhurst Mild (3.5% ABV)</b> Traditional dark mild, well-balanced, refreshing with a biscuity flavour.</p>		
	<p><b>Nyewood Gold (5.0% ABV)</b> Robust golden brown strong bitter very hoppy and fruity throughout with a tasty balanced finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Wild (4.7% ABV)</b> This is a brewery blend of Mild and the 6% ABV Wassail - hence the name.</p>		
<p><b>CUSTOM BEERS</b> Haywards Heath, West Sussex</p>	<p><b>Chinook (4.2% ABV)</b> This is light brown in colour with Chinook hops evident in aroma and taste. A hoppy bitterness is maintained in the taste and long dry finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Quality of Life (4.5% ABV)</b> A brand new beer from Peter Skinner, brewed specially for The Martlets Hospice 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary; all proceeds from the sale of this beer go to the charity. <i>Sorry no tasting notes available yet.</i></p>		
	<p><b>Saaz Demi Wheat (4.5% ABV)</b> Brewed using a half wheat, half malt mash, this light coloured beer also has the famous Saaz hops in the brew.</p>		
	<p><b>Tomahawk Strong Ale (5.5% ABV)</b> A strong-tasting hoppy bitter brewed with American Tomahawk hops.</p>		
<p><b>DARK STAR</b> Ansty, West Sussex</p>	<p><b>Amsinck Black (4.2% ABV)</b> Named after GS Amsinck, the famous brewing expert from the 19th century. A dry ebony coloured beer with a full roasted flavour and a clean Challenger hop aroma.</p>		
	<p><b>EPA (4.5% ABV)</b> Challenger hops provide the bittering while East Kent Golding hops are added late in the boil to provide freshness. Maris Otter and Cara malts make this a very drinkable light straw-coloured ale.</p>		
	<p><b>Hophead (3.8% ABV)</b> A golden-coloured bitter with a fruity/hoppy aroma and a citrus/bitter taste and aftertaste. Wonderfully hoppy and clean tasting with a refreshing mouth feel. Flavours remain strong to the end.</p>		
	<p><b>Imperial Stout (10.5% ABV)</b> Brewed with a high proportion of roasted barley and Target hops this a complex beer with a big flavour. Treat with upmost respect.</p>		

	<p><b>Original (5.0% ABV)</b> The brewery's eponymous former Champion Beer of Britain. A dark strong bitter beer with a complex malt flavour.</p>		
	<p><b>Spring Equinox (4.0% ABV)</b> A zesty ale; straw in colour and bursting with the fresh pale green fruitiness of Amarillo hops.</p>		
<p><b>FALLEN ANGEL</b> Battle, East Sussex</p>	<p><b>Caribbean Lime Lager (4.5% ABV)</b> A light copper-coloured beer with strong lime aroma and flavour.</p>		
	<p><b>Gamekeepers Bitter (4.1% ABV)</b> A traditional, hoppy bitter.</p>		
	<p><b>Kama Sumatra (4.0% ABV)</b> Dark brown in colour with coffee aroma with blackcurrant and coffee notes in the taste. Roast flavours dominate the finish.</p>		
<p><b>FILO</b> First In Last Out, Hastings. East Sussex</p>	<p><b>Cardinal (4.4% ABV)</b> A dark porter with burnt caramel, malt and a dry finish with coffee and hops.</p>		
	<p><b>Crofters (4.0% ABV)</b> A mid-brown beer with a "typical bitter" and fruit aroma, the taste has malt berry fruits and toffee. A hoppy finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Ginger Tom (4.4% ABV)</b> This a light-brown beer with some hoppiness and a ginger flavour.</p>		
	<p><b>Gold (4.8% ABV)</b> A golden premium ale pleasantly flavoured and lightly hopped.</p>		
<p><b>GRIBBLE</b> Gribble Inn, Oving, West Sussex</p>	<p><b>Porterhouse (5.1% ABV)</b> Brewed to recipe dating back to the 1800's, this traditional Porter has a smooth mellow palate, with the slightest hint of liquorice.</p>		
	<p><b>Slurping Stoat (3.8% ABV)</b> A light-coloured, hoppy session bitter.</p>		
<p><b>HAMMERPOT</b> Hammerpot, West Sussex</p>	<p><b>Meteor (3.8% ABV)</b> A chestnut coloured session bitter with a combination of malts giving a depth of character. Smooth in the mouth yet with a hop character derived from fine English hops that gives a pleasant refreshing and slightly dry finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Red Hunter (4.3% ABV)</b> Deep mahogany to ruby red bitter. A full bodied rich and slightly vinous malt character soundly balanced with finest English hops.</p>		
	<p><b>Woodcote (4.5% ABV)</b> A tangy amber bitter with a pleasant dry finish. Brewed with English Northdown hops.</p>		
	<p><b>(New Beer)</b> We are expecting a new beer from Hammerpot, but we have no details yet.</p>		
<p><b>HARVEY</b> Lewes, East Sussex</p>	<p><b>1859 Porter (4.8% ABV)</b> This is brewed to a 1859 recipe, coffee and hop notes are dominant in the taste and the long finish.</p>		













	<p><b>Old Ale (4.0% ABV)</b> A rich, dark beer a good malty and fruit aroma. The flavour is a complex blend of roast malt, grain, fruit, hops and some caramel. Malty caramel finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Star of Eastbourne (6.0% ABV)</b> Originally brewed for the 2004 Eastbourne Beer Festival; this is a very hoppy beer with a long dry finish.</p>		
	<p><b>Sussex Best Bitter (4.0% ABV)</b> This is a full-bodied brown bitter. A hoppy aroma leads to a good malt hop balance, and a dry aftertaste. CAMRA's Champion Best Bitter 2005 &amp; 2006.</p>		
	<p><b>Tom Paine (5.5% ABV)</b> Tom Paine is a premium dry hopped bitter named after the celebrated 18<sup>th</sup> century radical who lived in Lewes. Hoppy and bitter with a long dry finish.</p>		
HEPWORTH Horsham, West Sussex	<p><b>Iron Horse (4.8% A.B.V)</b> A premium bitter with a dense flavour and subtle sweetness.</p>		
	<p><b>Prospect (4.5% ABV)</b> Brewed from natural organic ingredients including Sussex Barley malt, Golding and Admiral hops which provide a well-balanced bitter beer.</p>		
	<p><b>Pullman (4.2% ABV)</b> A sweet, nutty maltiness and fruitiness are balanced by hops and bitterness in this easy-drinking, pale brown bitter, with a subtle finish.</p>		
KEMPTOWN Brighton & Hove	<p><b>Black Moggy Mild (3.8% ABV)</b> Red-black in colour; this mild has a roasted malt base with hop notes coming through with some dryness.</p>		
	<p><b>SID (5.2% ABV)</b> A black beer with Porter-like characteristics; the dry flavour leads to increasing bitterness with hops evident.</p>		
KING Horsham, West Sussex	<p><b>Bullion (4.2% ABV)</b> Brewed using only American Bullion hops; these are prominent in the aroma and flavour, it is mid amber in colour. One of the single hop range of brews.</p>		
	<p><b>Horsham Best (3.8% ABV)</b> A predominately malty best bitter, brown in colour. The nutty flavours have some sweetness with a little bitterness that grows in the aftertaste.</p>		
	<p><b>Mother-in-Law (4.1% ABV)</b> A brewery version of the classic blend, King's Old and Horsham Best; mid to dark brown and full flavoured.</p>		
	<p><b>Red River (4.8% ABV)</b> A full-flavoured mid brown beer with a red tinge. Very malty with some berry fruitiness in the aroma and taste. Balanced finish with bitter notes.</p>		
LANGHAM Lodsworth, West Sussex	<p><b>Stairway to Heaven (3.5% ABV)</b> A new brew from this brewery; sorry no tasting notes available.</p>		
	<p><b>Sundowner (4.2% ABV)</b> Golden amber in colour with hoppy and fruity notes. Has a dry finish.</p>		

<b>RECTORY</b> Streat, East Sussex	<b>Irish Best Stout (4.5% ABV)</b> Dark and full-bodied; a classic Irish dry stout, with a dry bitter aftertaste.		
	<b>St Valentine's (4.2% ABV)</b> A light coloured bitter with a distinctive hop character.		
<b>ROTHER VALLEY</b> Northiam, East Sussex	<b>Blues (5.0% ABV)</b> A dark winter ale/porter with notable hop character and a hoppy dry finish.		
	<b>Copper Ale (4.1% ABV)</b> Copper coloured, quite bitter in flavour with a small amount of chocolate to balance. Dry short finish.		
	<b>Level Best (4.0% ABV)</b> Full-bodied tawny session bitter with a malt and fruit aroma, malty taste and a dry, hoppy finish.		
	<b>Sandhurst Traditional (4.3% ABV)</b> Contract brewed to be bottled for Hoad's Farm Sandhurst; it is a bitter brewed with 3 hop varieties; Brambling Cross, Progress and WGV.		
	<b>Smild (3.8% ABV)</b> A traditional dark mild with a full roast body with a hint of chocolate.		
<b>WELTONS</b> Horsham, West Sussex	<b>Blind Date (4.6% ABV)</b> Light copper colour with pineapple flavours and citrus aromas, laced with ginseng.		
	<b>Horsham Old (4.5% ABV)</b> Roast and toffee flavours predominate with some bitterness in this traditional old ale. Bitter-sweet with plenty of caramel/roast, short finish.		
	<b>Ice Gold Spice (5.1% ABV)</b> Golden beer spiced with coriander, ginger, bay and grains of paradise!		
	<b>Schneider Gold (4.1% ABV)</b> Golden Pilsner style beer, light hopped and with a big aroma. Brewed using only organic ingredients.		
<b>WHITE</b> Bexhill-on-Sea, East Sussex	<b>1066 Country Bitter (4.0% ABV)</b> Amber-gold in colour, a light, sweetish beer with good malt and hop balance and a bitter refreshing finish.		
	<b>Chilly Willy (5.1% ABV)</b> Ruby/dark brown in colour with dark treacle and liquorice in the taste and spice notes in the aroma with slightly spicy herb finish.
